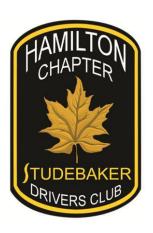

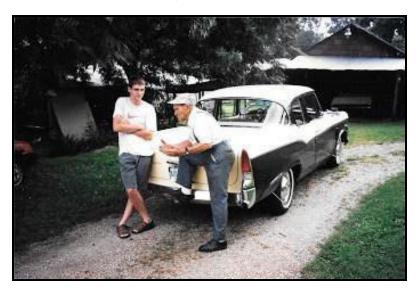

A 1956 GOLDEN HAWK RESTORED IN REMEBERANCEby Wayne Hamilton

In 1995 Andrew, 15, purchased a 1956 Golden Hawk from Adolf List (87) of Carlisle, Illinois. At the age of 18 Andrew drove his 1956 Studebaker Champion down to visit Adolf. The Champion was all original with only 70,000 miles on the odometer. Below is the Champion with Adolf giving Andrew a few automotive tips.



Andrew worked on the Golden Hawk while in high school, along with other cars that captured his interest. The Golden Hawk was a total rotisserie restoration with Andrew doing the sheet metal fabricating, welding and body work. The chassis was totally stripped then hot dip galvanized before reassembly began. I did all the mechanical work on the engine and transmission conversion.

Andrew passed away in 2006 and the car was put into storage. In 2014 I brought it out from the barn and decided to finish it the way Andrew and I had discussed. Every day I spent working on the car I was remembering the passion Andrew had for it. This project was a labour of love. The car was completed in March 2017.

BUILD DETAILS AND MODIFICATIONS

<u>Engine</u> - Packard 352-ci (internally stock). Brackets were fabricated to mount the Sanden A/C compressor in the generator location. Additional brackets were required to mount the 100 amp alternator to allow for hood clearance. The Oldsmobile oil pump conversion was installed with internal piping changes that allowed for the full flow external spin on oil filter.

<u>Transmission</u> - A Mustang shifter boot was installed on a 1980 Grenada 4 speed manual transmission with 30% overdrive. The car was originally a 3 speed O/D model.

<u>Body</u> - The hood was modified to allow for the installation of the 1963 side grills with signal lights. This was required due to the elimination of the fender mounted lights. I replaced the cowl with one from a 1962 Hawk along with the lower windshield chrome mouldings. Chrome upper door moldings from a 1955 hardtop were

installed along with lower Crown Molding pieces from the 1957-58 hardtops. The stainless two-tone trunk trim from the 1956 coupes was installed to have a clean break for the new two-tone paint scheme.

<u>Interior</u> - The front bench seat was replaced with modified reclining bucket seats. A modified rear seat arm rest was installed between the seats. Stainless steel headliner bows from a 1962 Hawk replaced the original plastic bows. Upholstery credits go to Jim Lawrence - FBN Industries, W Virginia.

<u>Chassis</u> - The chassis was blasted clean then hot dipped galvanized. Turner disc brake conversion was installed. A 1962 Hawk front sway bar replaced the original bar. The Twin Traction differential is from a 1963 R2 4 speed Avanti with 4:09 gears. Jeep Cherokee 6" rims have 205-75-15 Diamond Back WW radial tires mounted with 1956 hub caps.

<u>Editors notes:</u> Wayne's Golden Hawk is beautiful and a wonderful tribute to his son Andrew. There were only 4,071 Golden Hawks built in 1956, 3,471 in South Bend with the remaining 600 in the California plant. Wayne's was built in California

Wayne and Sharon left home in the Golden Hawk and '85 Avanti last May to attend the Studebaker International Meet in South Bend. The Hawk only had 110 miles on the odometer. Wayne entered it for judging in the "modified, with a Studebaker engine division" and came home with a "best in division award" with 400 points. The trip was problem free and Wayne told me that the Hawk was a delight to drive.

HAMILTON CHAPTER HELPS STUDENTS TAKE FLIGHT

In 2017 chapter president Roly Lusted accompanied by several of our members attended a dinner meeting of the Burlington Lions' Club. At this meeting, Malcolm Ramsay, who is a representative of the Canadian Warplane Heritage Museum, spoke on its programme High Flight. This programme provides a rare opportunity for students in Grade 6 from Hamilton's inner city to enjoy an educational opportunity which is sponsored by local non-profits and service agencies. Project High Flight ensures that these students are not left out because their parents cannot afford such an experience. Sponsorship for an "at risk" class is \$625 per class of 25 students. Two classes are sponsored from each school for a total cost of \$1250. We welcomed Malcolm to speak at one of our meetings about this project. It was proposed that our club sponsor one class. Members voted overwhelmingly to contribute and all of the money needed for this endeavour was donated by our members. We sponsored students from Cathy Weaver School which is in the area of the former Studebaker Hamilton plant.

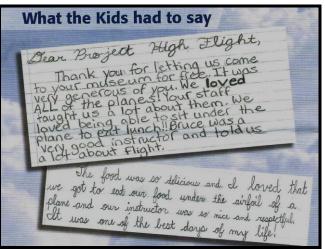
The programme creates an exciting approach to the Ontario Science and Technology Curriculum, specifically the Properties of Air and Characteristics of Flight. All this takes place in an aviation environment with "classrooms" situated beside or under the Museum's aircraft. Staff at the museum consists of pilots, retired teachers and school administrators, Scout and Guide leaders. All of these volunteers have an intense passion for aviation.

On January 18th, chapter president Peter Downey and past president Roly Lusted were on hand to meet the students at the museum for their day. It was rewarding to speak to them about our chapter's involvement. President Peter Downey spoke at our January meeting and told members if they ever doubted their donations, just seeing the involvement of these students on flight simulators and other equipment was proof of just how worthwhile the programme is. Students are also treated to lunch for the day and for some it may have been their first meal of the day.

The Canadian Warplane Heritage Museum is a living museum where all of the planes fly. Our chapter is fortunate to be able to hold our monthly meetings at the museum. Donating to this worthwhile project was just one way that we can give back. Pictured here are our members with our cheque for \$625. In all, it was and is, money well spent.

STUDE HUNTING IN CUBA - 2017by Steve Tournay

This little travelogue starts with my oldest bud, and fellow SDC member, Garnet Bell, who some years ago developed the habit of vacationing in Cuba with family; having fallen pretty hard for the place, its climate, its people and its constant cruise night of pre-1960 cars, Garnet didn't take too long to begin pestering me to travel to Cuba as well. A constellation of factors in late 2017 made it possible for me to make the trip at last, and so, in the last week of November 2017, from grey and chilly Ontario, off we went aboard an Air Transat 737.

Exiting Varadero's Juan Gomez airport terminal, we hadn't even approached our hotel bus when my gaze fell on the airport's public parking lot which resembled a typical midsummer cruise-in in Ontario. And so it began! Arriving at our hotel, the Gran Caribe chain's Be Live Experience Varadero (nee Villa Cuba and still called that locally), our bus halted nose to nose with a superb blue-and-white '59 Olds 88 ragtop that was every bit as nice as any Olds on our local scene back home. Already I was thankful for digital photography, with thousands of images on a tiny card. I hate to think of how much 35mm film this trip would have consumed...

As this is a car, and more precisely Studebaker, centred piece, I'll quickly summarize the "touristy" aspects of our trip thus: things that began with C were of special note. The cars, of course, were the principal reason for my accompanying Garnet this year. The climate was, well, disorienting for a Canadian in late November; even what rain there was, was warm. The coffee was heavenly...even the coffee from the machine in the hotel buffet! The Caribbean Sea, about half a city block from our little villa behind the main hotel, was three or four-tone turquoise, and seemed to be the same temperature as the hotel pool. The crafts were varied and delightful. And the Cubanos and Cubanas themselves were just as varied and captivating. The impression one gets is that everyone on the island is some sort of musician, artist or craftsman of great skill. One does not, for example, expect to hear Puccini's aria O Mio Babbino Caro sung gloriously, a cappella, by a band vocalist in the hotel pool bar. But that's what I did in fact hear one evening.

On to Studebakers. Garnet and I decided to walk toward the edge of downtown Varadero and catch one of the tourist shuttle buses to one of the craft markets. On the main road was a constant parade of classic cars, one of which I accidentally flagged down by pointing it out to Garnet. It was a nicely-done "phantom" car, a '56 Ford Fairlane four-door convertible (there are many such open-top conversions here) and (also common) it was a taxi. In we got and went downtown. And before that ride was over we'd made our first Cuban Stude sighting. Garnet noted a white ragtop with a large Cuban flag decorating the deck lid. I recognized the distinctive contours of the car's aft end and hollered "Studebaker!" to the car's driver as we went by in the Ford; he waved. The Stude with the patriotic tail art was a '50 or '51, but its front end had been rather drastically restyled with a Buick-like transverse grille. I grabbed a couple shots of it from the Ford, which was good, as we did not spot that particular Stude again.

On the streets around the craft market were parked numerous vehicles, some classics, some taxis, some modern Eurasian compacts. And one little red four-door that put me into instant stitches. Whatever it was, whatever it's vintage, its owner clearly really, really wanted to drive a Studebaker. The homemade-looking oblong grille was centered with a '50 Stude bullet (perhaps the one off the white ragtop?); then out back was the real feature, the trunk had been made into a pickup bed, with large raised STUDEBAKER lettering on the tailgate. I have no idea what the car's make or vintage was. We agreed, however, that it was a delight...and hilarious. Garnet christened it The Pseudobaker.

A bus excursion into and through Havana was pretty much obligatory, so off we went on the Sunday of the trip. Varadero was wonderland enough from an old-car standpoint; Havana was a positive dreamscape. Our first stop in Havana was at an apparently famous rum-and-cigar store on an upper floor of an old stone building in what it must be acknowledged was a pretty tough area of the city. Our bus disappeared while we were in the shop, causing a bit of consternation until we worked out that the bus had to park on a side street. In the course of finding the bus, I spied a familiar roofline across the street. It proved to be a '57

Studebaker sedan, maybe a Champion, maybe a Commander...any distinguishing trim was long gone. A gent who was likely the owner was on a nearby row-house porch and we chatted briefly, sort of. Incidentally, I said this was a tough area, and it was, but I must say I wasn't fearful there...rather I was fascinated: this was like no other place I had ever been.

We visited Old Havana too, of course, walking as a group through the old colonial town (which, logically enough, in places reminded me of Old Quebec or Old Montreal). Here, whiplash could've been easy to suffer, with the absolute banquet of old cars in every direction. And some were Studebakers: here a bright-rose '55 roadster made from a coupe (the '55 Stude for some reason looks especially nice that way); there a superb red '50 Commander convertible. At the end of our visit I delayed the bus a minute or two by chasing the latter car to its spot at a taxi stand that looked like a cruise night and taking a bunch of photos of it. That was the cherry on that Sunday's sundae! Our guide, Lionel, who was a perfect fount of "groaner" jokes, also voiced the opinion that what Cuba had was not mechanics but magicians: keeping hundreds of sixty-plus-year-old cars going with only their available supply of all the wrong parts to do so. Many of the classics, for instance, are now powered with Russian-built diesel engines; some of the body modifications I saw displayed tremendous ingenuity and resourcefulness too.

All too soon it was time to board our homebound 737 and trade Cuba's warm brightness for Ontario's cold and grey. I won't soon forget Cuba, her cars and her people (and her coffee); already during the trip I'd talked any number of times about "the next time I'm down here", and I certainly hope that is not idle speculation...

I logged thirteen Studebakers among the dozens of classics seen during the trip, managing at least one reasonable photo of seven of them...

'50 Champion 4dr, green (Varadero)

'50-51 2dr convertible, white, Cuban flag on decklid (Varadero)

'50 2dr, modified aft roof and doors, blue (Varadero)

'50 Commander convertible, red (Havana)

'53 4dr, green (Havana)

'53-55 4dr, modified nose, grey (Havana)

'53-54 hardtop, maroon (Varadero)

'55 "phantom" 2dr convertible, rose (Havana)

'56 Sky Hawk, grey (Havana)

'57 4dr, possibly Champion, red-ochre (Havana)

'59-60 Larks, 3 examples, all 4dr (various locations)

...and an honourable mention to The Pseudobaker, whatever it really was!





















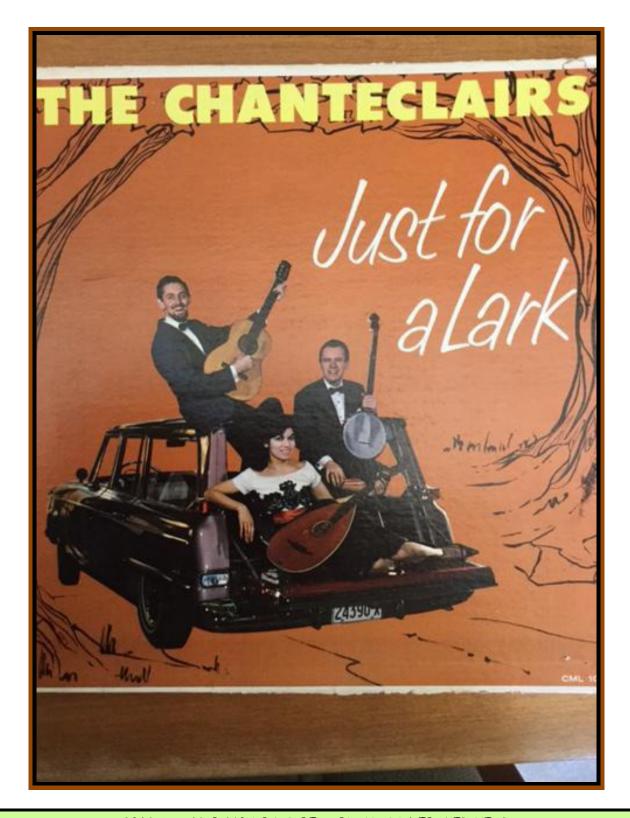




<u>Editor's note:</u> Steve captured a great cross section of Studebakers that still traverse the streets of Cuba. The amazing thing is that once the U.S. embargo closed the doors for any trading that included automobiles and auto parts, Cubans had to make do with what they had. The Cubans for the most part are, mechanically self taught and they have successfully kept these cars operational. When the Ladas coming from Russia entered the picture the Cubans regained some new cars. I remember talking to a man a few years ago when I went to Cuba who had a 1939 Chev coupe and he told me that a lot of the old cars are now powered with Lada engines, and this was because of the US embargo I mentioned.

Thanks Steve for a very interesting story and a great selection of Cuban Studebakers.

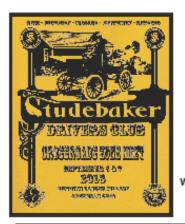
