

It's been 55 years since Studebaker closed production in South Bend, ending the iconic Hawk production, Studebaker truck production as well as Studebaker Avanti production, although the Avanti carried on for many years thereafter. Studebaker was known for being ahead of its time in the innovations and quality of its vehicles, but did you know they were about 115 years ahead of their time in producing all electric vehicles? Studebaker opted for electric (battery-powered) over gasoline propulsion. While manufacturing its own Studebaker Electric vehicles from 1902 to 1911, the company entered into body-manufacturing and distribution agreements with two makers of gasoline-powered vehicles, Garford of Elyria, Ohio, and the Everitt-Metzger-Flanders (E-M-F) Company of Detroit and Walkersville, Ontario. Studebaker began making gasoline-engined cars in partnership with Garford in 1904.

As we close 2018, our club has 71 members, all passionate about keeping the Studebaker name alive. We attended many events, and cruise nights showing our vehicles and telling people about Studebakers, and "no that isn't a Ford 289", it's a Studebaker 289!

Remember, our January pot luck and card party at the Grimsby Livingston Activities Centre, 1:00 pm, potluck at 4:00 p.m. Cards and games at 2 p.m. I look forward to seeing many of you there.

Almost two years after Ralph Hart left this earth, some of his most treasured possessions are now being dispersed. He purchased his '64 Avanti in the late 1970's and would tinker on it making changes for over twenty years. This was a car that he loved. Eventually, it would go to his younger brother, Lorne.

MTO wants their slice of the pie. If you are not directly named as the specific recipient of a specific car, you have to get an appraisal and pay the tax in order to change the ownership into your name. It took 90 minutes, to get that information resolved.

The next step was to transport the Avanti from Cambridge to Bath, Ontario (just west of Kingston). Paul and Lorraine Cronkwright offered to make it happen. It should have been easy. A lot of laughter helped.

Before we could accomplish our mission we had to replace the two batteries in the 2007 Dodge Ram quad cab first. Moving cars out of the storage building only required manpower. No, woman power too! Paul had replaced the tail lights on the car trailer and found and attached the winch for pulling the car onto it. But, it only worked intermittently, requiring more man/woman power. Finally ready to go, we merged into the 401 typical Friday traffic later than planned.


Then the fun began. Left rear tire on the trailer blew out in Mississauga, just before highway 410. It seemed that CAA (Canadian Automobile Association) would be a good idea. Hah! Did you know they have a policy to NEVER change a tire on any kind of trailer anywhere on the 401? It did not matter how far off the road or that it was safer than a parking lot in our particular location. Their POLICY stated that they must unhook our trailer and hook it up to their truck and then proceed to tow it with a flat tire (and the precious Avanti) to a "safe place of their choosing". So, we changed the tire ourselves.

We stopped at the Canadian Tire store in Bowmanville to buy two new tires on rims to replace the older tires and once more we had a spare. We didn't make it to Bath for lunch, but did get there in time to unload before dark followed by a wonderful dinner and overnight stay at the home of Lorne and Doris Hart. Lorne looked like a boy on Christmas morning. No doubt he will have great pleasure replacing brakes and getting the Avanti running again.

On Saturday we decided to take the scenic route home along the Loyalist Parkway. Just before the Genora Ferry, we had another blowout. The temperature outside had dropped 20 degrees Celsius. This is only relevant because of the laughter when Paul wore my long sleeved blouse over his shirt to change the tire, it had gotten pretty chilly. The three of us were getting pretty good at who needed to do what. You may want to consider our team for a pit crew if you take up race car driving!

We had hoped that returning to Bowmanville and the CTC where we purchased the new tires that we might end up with a new replacement tire. That did not happen. We did have a brake specialist spend a little time under the trailer. He concluded that the latest blowout was probably caused by the electric brakes that had intermittently self-applied hence the tire wear. Why one side and not the other? Why now with no load? Paul cut the blue wire that powered the brakes. With no load on, it would be fine (better than another blow-out!). Rewiring will come later, certainly before another car gets a free ride.



Applied Technology: Tire Pressure Sensors

Some of the newer cars have been equipped with the tire pressure sensors for a number of years now. The sensors are in essence, a transmitter/pressure gauge that sends data to the car's computer. They are not cheap, priced at between \$75 and \$150 each. The projected life expectancy is 10 years of the built in battery life but some are known to have failed in as little as 4 years. The batteries cannot be taken out and replaced so the whole unit has to be replaced. As if this is not bad enough, some of the sensor units are made of aluminium and break easily as a person tries to remove them in order to add more air into the tire. They are not repairable so a new sensor needs to be installed. It can be presumed that many motorist will consider the sensors as a bit of frivolous equipment but nowadays, the cars that are equipped with them are considered to have them built in as part of the safety system and operating a vehicle with one sensor missing is considered as circumventing the safety system. Not a good idea as viewed by law enforcement and the insurance underwriters. In the case of a motorist deciding to purchase a new set of wheels for the winter tires, he would need to purchase sensors for each of the tires. Apparently, a motorist did want to purchase a new set of tires and wheels for his car that was equipped with the sensors and did not want to purchase the sensors. The shop had the customer sign a liability waiver form. The car was later, involved in an accident and still, despite the motorist having signed the liability waiver, the court decided that the tire shop, operating as a business professional, should have known not to have equipped the wheels without the sensors and thereby circumventing the built in safety feature. It is said that the tire shop had to pay a hefty amount to satisfy the claim in court.
