


WHEN A BELT HELD UP MORE THAN YOUR TROUSERS

oing into 1892, Clem and Peter Studebaker were hot enthusiasts for the planned gathering to celebrate the 400th anniversary of Columbus' discovery of the Americas. As part of Indiana's response to exposition officials of all 44 states, the brothers decided to sponsor a Studebaker exhibit the world would remember. With their new Chicago repository, just down the street from the yet-to-be start of Rte 66, the Studebakers felt they wanted to participate in a big way in the successes of the fair. Because of the enormity of the endeavor, the 1892 Chicago World's Fair did not actually open until May, 1893.

Even with the downturn in the economy the Studebakers prepared an incredible display of their products and a beautiful souvenir booklet describing, in Currier and Ives

factory stvle. the and their products. In the narrative of the booklet it describes a factory covering 95 acres (72 football fields) that contained: length of line shafting 6000 feet, number of pulleys on shaft 1000, number of dynamos in use 15, number of board feet of lumber on hand 48,000,000, and length of all belting 7 miles. Dynamos are mentioned here because they were direct current power sources used prior to the widespread acceptance of AC of factory shafts, pulleys and belts). Thirty types of



current motors in 1896 (see factory photo at right

vehicles were displayed with images of men working in a factory setting that seemed more like a community.

Cottonwood and whitewood were the woods of choice for the vehicles manufactured. The cottonwood tree is very common and readily available in the Midwest, while whitewood is cut from many types of trees including the following: spruces, basswoods, tulip, pines and silver firs. The name whitewood comes from the white grain isolated from the dark sap wood. The importance of the wood cannot be overstated with over half of the Studebaker factory devoted to lumber yards and drying kilns.

Because this technology is so antiquated. a reference is added to a website where one can see a factory museum still operating with shafts, pulleys, and belts since 1903, when the factory was started. (In Google go to Sept. 10, 2009 Video of Raye's Mustard Mill in Eastport, Maine**). When viewing this video imagine yourself touring the Studebaker complex at the time of the 1893 World's Fair.

A change in the wind was on the horizon. Starting in 1902, Studebaker began to dabble in automobile manufacturing, and by 1911 had jumped in with both feet. However, the first Studebaker automobile produced in its entirety at the old wagon works in South Bend wasn't until April 30, 1920. It was at this same time that the last buggy and farm wagons were built. It is said that had J.M. Studebaker still been living the change to automobiles may not have occurred so quickly.

By 1921 Studebaker was polishing a new reputation for itself. In the July *Co-Operator*, a factory magazine, it was stated that only Ford had manufactured more automobiles during the first half of the year than Studebaker. By 1923 the fledgling auto company had grown so much that the sales for that year alone exceeded the total horse-drawn vehicle sales from 1852 to 1920. And of course, by this time the belt had been relegated to holding up your trousers and operating the cooling and electrical system in our Studebakers.

**One final note, Raye's Mustard is the creme de la creme of mustards. Please try it or donate to the museum.

A random coincidence for the record books:

It's the early evening of an early October day, in the mid 1990's. My wife Marg and I had just purchased our groceries and were heading the 2 miles home in our mint, low mileage Olds Delta 88 along the straight stretch of River Road in Kitchener. A car with round headlights and an old car silhouette is heading toward us. Hey - it's a finned Hawk!! It's dark in colour - and I think it must likely be the well-named SDC'r Dave Hawkes since we have no other dark coloured finned Hawks close by.

The car goes by - but it's two-toned (Dave's is solid black) and has non-Ontario licence plates and it was a '57. Dave's is a '59. So - Who is it? What is a "foreign" Silver Hawk doing driving up River Road so late in the day? When did the car come to Canada if it is displaying out-of-province plates? Where did it come from? Why am I still driving toward home? The W5 questions! I DON'T KNOW the answer to any!! So, we make a fast U-turn and catch up to the Stude! Following closely, waving frantically, and honking the horn has no effect. Finally we get to an intersection where we can pull along side. Yelling the word "Studebaker" and attempting to show my SDC membership card eventually demonstrated our friendly intentions, and a younger woman rolled down the passenger window. A man was driving. A very hurried conversation confirmed that we were not chasing them because we were angry, and that, incredibly, they were tourists - from California!

Well, this was amazing! Here was a married couple, the Sanborns, Tom, a building architect and Barb a landscape architect, from Oakland California. They knew Studebaker guru Jim Maxie in South Bend Indiana. The plan was for Jim to pick out a good Studebaker for them (he found the '57 Silver Hawk) and make it ready to drive on vacation around the nation. This vacation adventure was to be "spontaneous" and no firm destination was planned! When they flew to pick up

the car in South Bend, they asked around as to what places/festivals they should head towards. The summer was over, but someone mentioned the famous Oktoberfest in Kitchener-Waterloo, Ontario. Off they went!

When Marg and I caught up to them, they were following some incorrect directions, going the wrong way to a large fest-hall they had heard of. Amazingly, they were happy to follow us to our house (!) to get better directions to the hall, to a hotel, and to a shop that could make a small repair to the car. They said that this was just the sort of spontaneous thing they hoped would happen on the trip! We had a great time together for a couple of hours that evening! Incredible! I was able to see them off the next morning, as they continued their unplanned tour, ending that year's leg of the tour in Annapolis Maryland where the Hawk (the Batmobile they called it) went into storage to await their resumption of the trip the next year. Then they flew back home. The next year's adventure saw them travel from Annapolis to New Orleans and the year after that the Hawk took

We exchanged Christmas cards for next few years (they called our family "the Stude Elves"). I'm thinking of buying a current SDC roster, see if they're listed, and hopefully catch up on the last 25 years! What a coincidence that the Hills would be driving down River Road that evening at the same time that the Sanborns would be driving up - and on the advice of poor directions given to Tom and Barb! A few seconds either way, and we would have missed each other! "Serendipity" for sure!

There is a Studebaker story to almost everything, you know! And if it's Studebaker stories - even murder mysteries(!) - that you like, you can read 5 Studebaker-related books in a series by South Bend author Jeanne Dams. The central character in this series of historical fiction mystery books is Hilda Johansson, a maid in the household of Clement Studebaker, actual president of the Studebaker Brothers Manufacturing Company. The house she lives in is Tippecanoe Place, Clement's mansion which, in real life, is the well-known restaurant so many of us have been to over the last 30 or so years. The 5 books are progressive in time, as Hilda solves one mystery, gains confidence, solves the next one too, gets a promotion, gets engaged - well, you get the picture! All the while, you learn about the life of a maid in a wealthy household in that period, the life in a worker's home as well (her relatives), the morals and practices of working people at the turn of the last century and the places and features of the city of South Bend 120 years ago. Fantastic!

They are light, fun reads, all of them and I'd recommend them to any Studebaker history buff with a little time to do some light reading. They were fun! The books are available online at ABE Books, Better World Books, and perhaps Amazon. The titles are:

My Studebaker Story (Cliff Tattersall)



My family emigrated to Canada in 1954 and knowing nothing of Canadian cars my father bought what he knew, a Hillman Minx. It serviced us well until 1957 when it fell to pieces. It was traded into the Studebaker Dealer (International Garage) for a 1953 Studebaker Champion. BTW at the time International Garage in St. Catharines was the longest serving Studebaker dealership in Canada. It was owned by a man named William (Bill) Jones, his salesperson was his son, Tom.

The car was salmon pink with a white roof, a four-door sedan with an overdrive transmission. I remember the car had nice upholstery and that it

had overdrive, my father hardly ever used first gear as second, he said was a good starting gear. I do not remember much of the car as shortly after it was purchased my parents sent me back to England for a year and when I came back, he traded the car for a 1957 Studebaker Champion 4 door sedan without overdrive. This was a mistake as the new 4 lane highways were just being completed and on a trip to Cornwall, he drove too fast and had to rebuild the engine. Somehow the car made trips to Massachusetts without incident, but the trip Cornwall had done the car in. One thing I liked about the was the Cyclops speedometer. By now the dealership in St Catharines was no more. It appears one day the employees found a pad lock on the door and no owners about. It was appeared that Mr. Tom Jones had emptied the money from the dealership and fled the country. He was later located in California and that was that.

There was no dealership in St. Catharines for some time. Eventually a new dealership by the name of Bradley Motors found itself in a new purpose-built building. That building now harbours a Chrysler Dealership.

With the new dealership opened and used cars on the lot my father and I took a liking to a used 1960 Studebaker Lark, V8, Automatic, Twin Traction. We took it for a test drive on the Queen Elizabeth Highway from Ontario Street to the Martindale turnoff. Not a long distance. My father "floored it" and within what seemed a nanosecond we were doing 100 mph. I was impressed, so was my father. We went back to the dealership and

made an offer to purchase the car. The salesperson said he would consider the offer and get back to us. A day or so later we went back to the dealership and the salesperson said his manager needed more than my father had offered, two hundred more than my father's offer. My father walked away disgusted. It was the only time in my life I heard my father utter to "F" word. A week later he went down the same street and bought a 1960 Chevrolet, two door, 6 cylinder for what he refused to pay for the Studebaker. I thought long and hard about that lark for years.

When I retired and had time for old cars my memories of that "failed purchase" came to mind and I searched for a 1960 Lark V8. I found one in Minnesota drove there and could not make a deal. On the way back I dropped into South Bend and spent part of a day visiting to the Studebaker Museum. I was now determined to buy a Studebaker.

Not realizing that the best resource was to join the SDC and local chapter, I took to eBay and located a 1955 President, 4 doors in Prescott Arizona. It had not sold on eBay, so I contacted the owner and asked what he wanted, realistically. I had always wanted to see the Grand Canyon and route 66 so a friend of mine and I did the trip together. Saw the car and after a few days made the deal. I was back in Studebakers again. I purchased two more after that but the closest I came to the 1960 Green Lark was a 1964 Green 4 door Commander with twin traction.

I am now back to owning just the 1955 President, it has served me well travelling to International and Regional meets in the USA.
